
#### Florida Student Population

- Majority of students are eligible for free and reduced priced lunch





#### Average NAEP 4th Grade Reading Scores, South Carolina, Florida and National Average 1992-2011





### Average NAEP 4th Grade Reading Scores for Students Eligible for Free and Reduced Price Lunch (FRL)





Intensive reading intervention happens K-3


Retention is a last resort

#### The Double Jeopardy of Struggling Readers

Children who are not reading proficiently in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade are 4 times more likely to not graduate high school

Below basic readers are almost 6 times more likely than proficient readers to not finish high school on time

Poor Black and Hispanic students who are struggling readers are about 8 times more likely than proficient readers to drop out of high school

#### An End to Social Promotion

- Emphasis on reading as a gateway to learning.
  - 3<sup>rd</sup> grade: students are <u>learning to read</u>.
  - 4<sup>th</sup> grade: students are <u>reading to learn</u>.
- Students who score the **lowest level** (level 1 out of 5) in reading on the 3<sup>rd</sup> grade FCAT **must be retained** unless the student meets good cause exemptions.



#### An End to Social Promotion

#### Six Good Cause Exemptions:

- Student demonstrates proficiency on an alternate standardized assessment (e.g. Stanford 10)
- Student demonstrates proficiency through a student portfolio
- Student with a disability who does not take the state test
- English Language Learners (ELL) who have had less than 2 years of English for Speaker's of Other Languages (ESOL) instruction
- Student with a disability who takes the state test and has previously been retained
- Any student with a reading deficiency who has previously been retained twice



#### Florida's K-3 Policy

Early Literacy screening in K-3 grades

**Parent notification** for any student identified with a reading deficiency K-3.

<u>Individual reading plans</u>, in collaboration with the parent, prescribing interventions aimed at removing that deficiency.

3<sup>rd</sup> graders who score at the <u>lowest level</u> on the state test are <u>retained</u> unless they meet a good cause exemption.

Retention with <u>more intensive interventions</u> (a different course of action)

#### Intervention for Retained Students

- Parent Notification
  - That his/her child has not met promotion requirements, and
  - Why the child is not eligible for a good cause exemption.
  - Describing the interventions to be implemented to accelerate progress to ensure student catches up with peers.
- Provide parents the option of a mentor, supplemental tutoring, or a "Read at Home" plan including participation in parent workshops and regular parentguided home reading



#### Intervention for Retained Students


Districts are required to provide retained 3<sup>rd</sup> graders more intensive interventions:

- Summer reading camps
- A minimum of 90 minutes of daily, uninterrupted, scientifically research-based reading instruction
- Daily intervention in addition to the 90 minute block
- A highly-effective teacher as determined by student performance data and performance evaluations





# Keys to Successful Policy Implementation



#### **State-Directed Activities**

#### Just Read, Florida!

- State Partnerships to raise awareness of the importance of Reading
- Training of teachers, reading coaches, and principals, face-to-face and online reading courses
- Individual reading plans, portfolio and alternative assessment guidance
- Families Building Better Readers
- Monitoring of implementation

## Professional Development: Key to Reading Success

- For teachers in the pipeline
  - Revision of K-12 reading certification test, to include latest reading research
  - Increased required reading courses in Colleges of Education to focus on the science of reading and data-based decision making



#### Funding: Key to Reading Success

#### Funding Actions

- Leveraged existing funds to make reading a priority:
  - State funds
  - State set-asides from federal funds
  - State and district-level federal funds
- Use of new state and federal money
- Tied funding to state-approved reading plans in 2005-06








#### A Command Focus on Reading

Retained kids made significant gains compared to promoted kids

Those gains grew substantially from year one to year two

Retained kids were able to catch up; promoted kids fell behind

The greatest impact in learning was for minority kids








### Third Grade Reading: Free and Reduced Price Lunch





■ Percent scoring in Lowest Level on Florida State Test


### Third Grade Reading: Students with Disabilities





■ Percent scoring in Lowest Level on Florida State Test


### Third Grade Reading: African American Students

### Third Grade Reading: Hispanic Students




Elementary School FCAT Reading Grades 3, 4 and 5







Elementary School FCAT 2.0 Reading Grades 3, 4 and 5








Middle School FCAT 2.0 Reading Grades 6, 7 and 8


High School FCAT Reading Grades 9 and 10








### Good Instruction Matters: Percent of Students Identified as Learning Disabled
